Around the World on the Longest, Shortest Day

What is the solstice?

On the 20th or 21st of June each year, the North Pole is tilted towards the Sun, so it gets more hours of sunlight and longer days. This is the summer solstice in the Northern Hemisphere. At the same time, the South Pole tilts away from the Sun, so it is the winter solstice in the Southern Hemisphere, and days are shorter and temperatures colder.

Did you know...

...that in **Antarctica** on the June solstice there are 0 hours of sunlight and above the **Arctic Circle**, such as in northernmost **Norway**, there are 24 hours of sunlight?

...in **Argentina**, they have a ritual where you write down your problems and then throw the paper into a fire? This symbolizes starting fresh.

...that in **Ilwaco, Washington**, many people speak Chinuk Wawa? They call the summer wam-ili?i. During the wam-ili?i solstice it's only true night-time for about two and a half hours.

...that every language has a word for the Sun? Some of the ones you'll learn in this book are *taiyou* (Japanese), *solen* (Norwegian), and *shams* (Arabic).

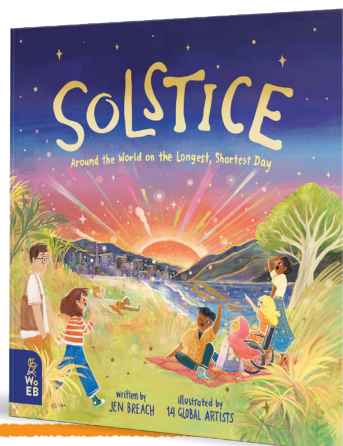
